through Him. John 1:15 says, "John bore witness about Jesus, and cried out, 'This was He of
whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks before me, because He was before me."

each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others" (Philippians 2:3-
4). Jesus never taught anyone to think of himself as than others, or to be selfish, or to be
conceited. Paul once asked, "What do you have that you did not?" (1 Corinthians 4:7).
Everything we have, everything we are, everything we hope to be comes by God's providence.
When we consider the grace and the providence of God, we have no to be arrogant.
The Lord Jesus practiced and taught Jesus taught his disciples, "If anyone would
be first, he must be last of all and of all" (Mark 9:35). He was saying, "You don't
become great by putting yourself before everyone else. You become great by putting yourself
, by serving other people." God doesn't want arrogant people; He wants people who greatly

Many people shy away from God when they sin, but we have a high priest who understands

If you listen to religious radio or TV, you've probably heard someone say, "The Lord spoke to
me and said" or they'll say "let God speak to your heart," suggesting that God speaks
to people today. Other people feel that the they possess are evidence of
God's will for their lives.
We're asking, how does God speak to us today? Is it through, or through feelings, or
through councils and creeds, or maybe through the living? We believe the Bible is
God's of truth to us today. The Word of God says, "God, after He spoke long ago to
the fathers in the prophets in many portions and in many ways, in these last days has spoken to us in
His Son, whom He appointed heir of all things, through whom also He made the world" (Hebrews
1:1-2). God gave all to Christ, who promised the Holy Spirit to the apostles and
prophets to them into all the truth. They this truth into the pages of the New
Testament. If we want to know the truth that sets us, we must go to the Word of God found
in the New Testament.
Our reading comes from Jesus' lips in the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 7:24-27.
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We shall be one day by the Words of Jesus. Jesus said, "He who rejects Me and does
not receive My sayings, has one who judges him; the word that I spoke is what will judge him at the
last day. For I did not speak on My own initiative, but the Father Himself who sent Me has given
Me a commandment as to what to say and what to speak" (John 12:48-49).
We're not going to be judged by opinion, by the of men, or by some
denomination's beliefs. We will be judged by the Words of Jesus found in the New Testament, so
we truly to know what the Bible says; don't we?
Jesus, by the Holy Spirit, gave His the Word that His Father had given to Him. In
John 14:25-26, Jesus told the apostles, "These things I have spoken to you while abiding with
you. But the Helper, that is the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach
you (that is, the apostles) all things, and bring to your remembrance (that is, you apostles) all that I
said to you." God determined that the Words that He had given Jesus would be by the
Spirit to the apostles for their time and for all time. The Words of Jesus were not merely for the first
century, oh no; but for century as long as this world stands! God "in these last days has
spoken to us in His Son." God is speaking to us in the!
Read what Jesus promised His apostles in John 16:12-15. The apostles knew the truth of
God-the whole truth of God. They were the spokesmen for God in their own day and really for
time.
Jude, the brother of Jesus, wrote, "Beloved, while I was making every effort to write you about
our common salvation, I felt the necessity to write to you appealing that you contend earnestly for
the which was once for all handed down to the saints" (Jude 3). Jude, who wrote
sometime between 65 and 80 AD, was already speaking of "the faith," that is, that body of doctrine,
which was "once for all time" handed down to the saints. What the Word said in the first century, it
also says and today in the 21st century. Jude wanted Christians not only to believe that
faith but also to "contend" for it, to it and to keep handing it down.
Paul told Timothy, his true son in the faith, "The things which you have heard from me in the
presence of many witnesses, you entrust these to faithful men who will be able to others
also" (2 Timothy 2:2). Paul wanted the truth to be passed down from generation to generation. This
is why Paul said, "There is one body and one Spirit, just as also you were also called in one hope of
your calling; one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all who is over all and through
all and in all" (Ephesians 4:4-6). There is indeed just one, and we are to contend for it.
When people get away from the one faith, they abandon the revealed will of God.
The writers of the New Testament with the authority of God. In 1 Corinthians 2:12-13,
Paul said, "Now we have received, not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit who is from God, so that
we may know the things freely given to us by God, which things we also speak, not in words taught
by human wisdom, but in those taught by the Spirit, combining spiritual thoughts with
spiritual words." Paul said what he taught didn't come from but from the Holy Spirit. God
was his teachings and his writings. That's why we can say whatever Paul said, we can
also say God said it, because both statements are true. God moved Paul to say the things he

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Later in his epistle, Paul deals with women speaking out in the church. Read what Paul said in
1 Corinthians 14:34-38. Paul would not be ignored; he had spoken the commandment.
On another occasion, Paul defends himself by explaining where he got his gospel. Paul said, "For
I would have you know, brethren, that the gospel which was preached by me is not according to
man. For I neither received it from man, nor was I taught it, but I received it through a revelation of
Jesus Christ" (Galatians 1:11-12). It was because of this that he could be so about his
gospel—that his gospel was true and right! It was actually the gospel of! In fact, the apostle
Paul warns everyone to stay with his gospel and not it. Anyone who changes his gospel
risks his soul and the souls of those he teaches.
Read Galatians 1:6-10 . God's written Word is and unchangeable. When you get
away from the Bible, you also God! Paul spoke well of the Thessalonians because of
their faith and obedience. He said, "For this reason we also constantly thank God that when you
received the word of God which you heard from us, you accepted it not as the word of men, but for
what it really is, the word of God, which also performs its work in you who believe" (1
Thessalonians 2:13). God's Word can work in our lives, when we are willing to to it and
it to our lives. Unless we humbly God's message, we cannot receive its
blessings.
God said, "So then, brethren, stand firm and hold to the traditions which you were taught,
whether by word of mouth or by letter from us" (2 Thessalonians 2:15). God has always
his people to stay with what they have learned from Jesus and his apostles, not
moving from those things or getting involved in human traditions or human ideas. There truly is but
one gospel, so please, please hold to it!
With so many, so many denominations, so many non-denominational community
churches saying so many different things, do they all speak for God when they contradict each
other? When they contradict themselves and argue with each other, are they really from God?
The Lord Jesus Himself distinguishes people, and here's how He does it. He does it by how they
and His Word. He said to the Jews, "If you continue in My word, then you are
truly disciples of Mine; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you" (John
8:31-32). To continue in Jesus' Word means to, abide, or stay there. Jesus said
"" disciples do that. Some people say that they're disciples, but they go to
other sources of information. Some believe they hear from God; some trust in their

The Bible taught in the first century some things we too need to Hebrews 2:1-3 says,
"For this reason we must pay much attention to what we have heard, so that we do not
drift away from it. For if the word spoken through angels proved unalterable, and every
transgression and disobedience received a just penalty, how will we escape if we neglect so great a
salvation?" It's very easy for us to become neglectful and away from the things we have
heard from the Scriptures. That's where the truth is! Not in our feelings, not in what makes us
happy, not in some council or creed or human tradition. Go to the Word for the Truth!
Feelings can deceive and men can be, but God's Word has stood for
centuries. It says today what it said from the beginning. You can it. Why not trust it and
become a Christian? You do that by trusting and loving the Lord; by turning away from sin in
; by confessing your in Jesus as the Son of God before all; and by being

study and worship with them. When you walk through the door, you'll feel welcome and wanted.
The best of life come from God's Word, the Bible. I don't know about you, but I
need a lesson now and then. Lessons teach us, so we might not make the same that
we've made in the past. Lessons open an opportunity for us to change our lives and to do
Because they point to something better, we have for the future. I thank God
for the lessons of the Bible; they me and help me to go in the right direction and avoid
the hazards of life. Some people think that people cannot change. Have you ever heard someone
say, "Well, that's just the way I am"; or "I can't change"; or "You can't teach an old dog new
tricks." Or maybe, "Well it's genetic; and I was born that way."
When I hear people say such things, I have to ask, "Is that really true?" Are we with
no ability to make changes in our spiritual or moral lives? Are we unable to repent? I have to admit
that that concept really doesn't square with what I've in people or with what I in
the Bible. Through the years, I've seen all kinds of people make changes in their
thinking and in their lives. I believe you can too!
Our reading today comes from the most famous story ever told, the story of the Prodigal
Son, Luke 15:17-24. What a marvelous story.

creation—or creature. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come" (2 Corinthians 5:17).
The apostle Paul explains this in God's Word. He says, "Put to death therefore what is earthly
in you: sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and covetousness, which is idolatry. On
account of these the of God is coming. And in these you too once walked, when you were
living in them. But now you must put them all away: anger, wrath, malice, slander, and obscene talk
from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you've put off the old self with its
practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its
creator" (Colossians 3:5-10). If people cannot change, why would God it? God's not
cruel. He doesn't expect us to do what we do! But God knows what we can do, and
He knows that we can change our thinking, our behavior, and our lives.

The Bible says: "The soul who sins shall die. The son shall not suffer for the iniquity of the
father, nor the father suffer for the iniquity of the son. The righteousness of the righteous shall be
upon himself, and the wickedness of the wicked shall be upon himself. But if a wicked person turns
away from all his sins that he has committed and he keeps all my statutes and does what is just and
right, he shall surely live; he shall not die. None of the transgressions that he has committed shall be
remembered against him; for the righteousness that he has done, for that he shall live. Have I any
pleasure in the death of the wicked, declares the Lord God, and not rather that he should turn from
his way and live?" (Ezekiel 18:20-23). God wants everyone to to Him, to change and do

that brings us a heartache.
I want to tell a story of forgiveness and freedom. In 1935, a family in Oklahoma with
eight children lost their father. The mother went to work as a nurse to the family, and the
children had to spend much time raising themselves. The youngest boy, as time went by, got into the
wrong crowd and began to do all the things that rebellious teens do. He often drank and
committed crimes. He would rather than pay for anything, even when he had money in
his pocket. As a young adult, he spent many nights in He was a strong, young man; and
if he had been drinking, he would tear up his jail cell. He was wanted for theft and burglary in

several states. Once, when he came home to visit family in the 1950s, he stole a check-writing
machine; he was caught and went to for four years. This got his attention. While he
was there in prison, his oldest sister and her husband came to visit him and talk about the Bible and
his Some fellow prisoners were also Christians, and they taught him what he should do to
be saved. He learned he had been baptized according to the teaching of the Scriptures
and he to be baptized.
He served his time and came out of jail in 1962 shortly before his mother died. At first, he was
humble and spiritually motivated, but before long, he to a rough life out in the oil
fields of Oklahoma. He was often drunk and took illegal drugs. His mouth was foul and his behavior
very obnoxious. For more than twenty years, he forgot the he made to God while he
was back in prison. In 1985, he attended my father's funeral and was very obnoxious; I said in my
heart that I didn't care if I ever saw him again. I regret saying that now.
But the Lord had something more in store for him. In 1987, he had gained a lot of weight and the
doctors told him that his heart was enlarged, like a cow's heart. They said he would soon if
he didn't change his ways. Many nights he would hunt raccoons and get drunk. He sometimes woke
up in a, not really knowing where he was. The doctor's words, though, hit home. He
remembered all the promises he had made to God and to his older sister while he was in prison.
Frantically he approached every preacher in town to find spiritual help. But none of them had time
for him. One even threatened to call the law.
Then he remembered the two family members who taught him in prison. He called me one
Friday night and asked me to come to his house and him about baptism. The next
morning, I was there and I had my Bible. He knew that he hadn't been baptized according to the
Scriptures and he wanted to know the So I began with Matthew 3 and told him how
Jesus fulfilled all righteousness and was baptized by John. I showed him that the one who believes
and is baptized will be (Mark 16:16). We learned that the baptism of Christ was the
birth of water and the Spirit (John 3:5); and a person must be again (verse 7). We
also learned that we needed to and to be baptized for the forgiveness of sin (Acts 2:38).
In baptism, we also learned that you go into the water and you come out of the
water (Acts 8:38-39); and that baptism is an immersion; it's a dipping or plunging in the water. We
also learned that when we're baptized it is at that time that our sins are away (Acts
22:16). We learned that baptism is into Christ; that's how you get into Christ, and it's also how you
get into the death of Christ; that we're baptized into His death, that we're with Him in
baptism, and raised with him in baptism to walk in newness of life (Romans chapter 6). We also
saw that our old man of sin was crucified with Him in baptism so that we can be from sin
(Romans 6:3-7). We learned many other things about baptism that day, that is that baptism doth also
now save us (1 Peter 3:21). And that He saved us by the washing of regeneration, the renewing of
the Holy (Titus 3:5). After we had finished about three hours of study, five precious souls went
down into that large pond behind their house, and they were baptized.
From that very day, my uncle never again. He began attending every time

the doors were open. His language was godly and his attitude was one of love and faith. He opened
his big old heart to everybody, everyone, and many, many prisoners. He
began reaching out to the prisoners at the county courthouse, and soon many of them were being
baptized. Then he went to other county jails, and it wasn't long until people there were being
baptized as well. Soon he went to the Oklahoma state prisons where he taught young men who had
fallen into the same sinful he himself had known in times past. He would speak straight
to them about sin but with lots of love, and they responded to it. From 1987 onward, he baptized
more than a souls into Christ with his own hands. My friends, I have to tell you,
never, never had I seen such a great change in a man.
That kind of change is not so unusual for people who come to Christ. The Bible says, "Do you
not know that the unrighteous will not inherit the kingdom of God? Don't be deceived: neither the
sexually immoral, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor men who practice homosexuality, nor thieves,
nor the greedy, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor swindlers will inherit the kingdom of God. And
such were some of you (that is, in the Corinthian church). But you were washed (God cleaned you
up), you were sanctified (God made you holy), and you were justified (God declared you innocent)
in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ and by the Spirit of our God" (1 Corinthians 6:9-11). God
them change from sinners to saints, and they made that change.
You probably know people who've left a sinful lifestyle and have come to Christ. They made
changes in their moral and spiritual lives. When you come to Christ, you become a
person. You have a new start! You're born again! If God could make a difference in the life of my
dear uncle, He can make a difference in people that you know too. If He could make a difference in
those Corinthians, He can make a difference in your life if you let Him. He can help you overcome
every sin and become the kind of person that you want to be.

be; but, thank God by His mercy and grace, I'm not what I used to be." God can help each of us
become the person that He intended for us to be. You can over sin by giving

literature is found in each book and reads those passages accordingly.
